COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Office Hours:

Information plays an important role in the lives of individuals around the world. Access to information is an important factor in the economic, social, cultural and political development of all nations. LIS 5241 focuses on analysis of information management and access at the national or country level in the context of international globalization. Students will develop the knowledge, skills and abilities needed to analyze and compare the social, cultural, economic and political factors that affect access to information and information service provision.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The following student learning objectives will be demonstrated through written assignments, class discussion, discussion board postings, group participation, and other weekly activities.

- Demonstrate familiarity with the literature from international organizations on the role of information in economic development and globalization;
- Identify the cultural, political and economic factors that impact the development of the information infrastructure and capacity of individual nations;
- Identify information access, management, and service provision principles, practices, and policies of three nations at different levels of economic development;
- Compare the development of information infrastructure and capacity for three nations at different levels of economic develop;
- Explain how information infrastructure and capacity influences and is influenced by information access, management and service provision principles, practices, and policies in three nations at different levels of economic development.

COURSE MATERIALS:

Required readings are provided through the course website.

Students will also be required to consult the electronic resources cited in the bibliography for the course and to supplement these with relevant readings identified through individual research using the databases provided by the FSU Libraries at http://www.lib.fsu.edu/. Instructional Technologies: Online Course Management System.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS AND EVALUATION:

Selection of countries for assignments and reports: (not for grade). Select three countries, one from each of the three income level groups provided in class. Use your selection for the group comparative report and for the individual final paper.

Six Cultural Dimensions: Write a 3-4-page report describing an experience with people from other cultural/racial/diverse groups. Indicate why it is important to be cognizant of these dimensions as an individual and as information professional and how this information may prove to be useful in the understanding of information issues at the international level.

Reflection Journals (3): Reflect on concepts, issues and strategies from readings and learning activities. Capture your reflections on weekly journals. Combined weekly journals are due electronically on weeks 5, 10, and 15.

Progress Report: Assess your progress toward the final paper and comparative report the participation and collaboration of members of your lab group.

Final Paper: Write a 5-6-page report on your comparative analysis of three countries.

Group Presentations (short lectures): Create a 20-25-minute lecture on a topic assigned by the instructor.

Group Presentations (comparative analyses): There are two parts to these presentations: (1) Present the results of your comparative analysis (paper), then, (2) compare your findings with those of two other students.

Class Participation: Includes class attendance, contributions to class discussions, presentations, and/or postings to discussion boards.
